

# Golden Arrow Resources Corporation

## MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDED JUNE 30, 2022 AND 2021

### Introduction

This Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A") should be read in conjunction with the condensed consolidated interim financial statements of Golden Arrow Resources Corporation ("the Company") for the six months ended June 30, 2022 and 2021 and related notes thereto which have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"). All figures are in Canadian dollars unless otherwise noted. This MD&A has been prepared as of August 24, 2022.

### Company Overview

Golden Arrow Resources Corporation (the "Company") was incorporated on September 22, 2015, under the Business Corporations Act in the province of British Columbia. The address of the Company's registered office is Suite 312 – 837 West Hastings Street, Vancouver, BC, Canada V6C 3N6. The Company is listed on the TSX Venture Exchange, trading under the symbol "GRG", the OTCQX, trading under the symbol "GARWF", and the Frankfurt Stock Exchange, trading under the symbol "G6A".

The Company is a natural resource company engaged in the acquisition, exploration and development of resource properties in South America. The Company is engaged in the business of acquiring, exploring and evaluating natural resource properties and either joint venturing or developing these properties further or disposing of them when the evaluation is completed.

### Principal Assets

Unless otherwise stated, the technical information provided below has been reviewed by Brian McEwen, P.Geol., VP Exploration and Development for the Company, and a Qualified Person as defined under National Instrument 43-101.

### 1. Chile

#### 1.1 San Pietro Iron Oxide-Copper-Gold-Cobalt Project

##### *1.1.1 Background*

On March 17, 2022, Golden Arrow announced that it had, through its wholly owned subsidiary New Golden Explorations Chile SPA, purchased a 100% interest in the San Pietro Iron-oxide Copper Gold ("IOCG") Project in Chile from Sumitomo Metal Mining Chile Ltda for cash consideration of US\$3,350,000. Following detailed due diligence, the project was deemed an excellent value proposition based on its multiple mineralized prospects, upside potential, and a strong rebound in copper, iron, gold and cobalt pricing since the last exploration work was completed in 2014 which focused mainly on copper despite indications of significant cobalt and iron at some targets.

The San Pietro Project includes 18,448 hectares of exploration and exploitation concessions in the Atacama region of Chile, approximately 100 kilometres north of Copiapo in an active mining district that is home to all the major IOCG deposits in Chile. There is excellent mining infrastructure in the area, and the property is situated immediately adjacent to the west of Capstone Copper's Santo Domingo mine development project and 10 km northeast of its Mantoverde mine. *[Proximity to other mining projects in the area does not provide any assurances with respect to the prospects at the San Pietro Project.]*

San Pietro is hosted in various andesite units as part of the Cretaceous volcano-sedimentary sequence associated with intrusive rocks such as granodiorites and diorites of similar age. The Project is located east of the Atacama Fault system, a major north-south regional structure, which was instrumental in the emplacement of the ore deposits in the area. Mineralization at San Pietro is typical of an IOCG system with copper-gold-iron-cobalt minerals in breccias, veins and mantos within a zone of K-feldspar-chlorite alteration. These structures are rich in magnetite and specularite and in some cases associated with calcite and were mainly developed along NW-SE lineaments.

The San Pietro Project has had nearly US\$15 million in exploration work by previous owners, including over 34,000 metres of drilling, over 1,000 surface samples and multiple geophysical surveys. Of the Project's five main target areas, the Rincones target has been the primary focus of the historic work, with multiple drill holes returning assays with significant copper, gold and cobalt values, including: 28 metres averaging 1.14% Cu, 0.12g/t Au, and 335ppm Co, in RA-12-DH-003.

### *1.1.2 Exploration*

The 2022 exploration program will work toward resource delineation, by continuing to evaluate and advance the known targets and explore other areas of the property. The program has commenced with re-logging of the more than 34,000 metres of drill core, as well as detailed surface mapping throughout the extensive property. Additional geophysical surveying and trenching are both expected to be completed. This work will modernize and build the database for the main prospects, particularly the Rincones area, to refine targets for a potential resource delineation drill program.

## 1.2 Rosales Copper Project

### *1.2.1 Background*

On July 20, 2020, Golden Arrow announced that it had acquired the Rosales Copper Project in Region III, Chile. The project currently includes approximately 3,285 hectares of 100% held properties and an additional 3700 hectares under application.

The project is road-accessible and is situated less than 90 kilometres from the mining centre of Copiapo, where full exploration and mining services and infrastructure are readily available. Rosales has near-surface copper stockwork mineralization with a target of a larger mineralized system at depth.

### *1.2.2 Exploration*

The initial reconnaissance program at Rosales identified two general areas of prospective mineralization: The Margarita Mine trend (MMT), and the NW Target.

The MMT is a 3.5-kilometre-long structural corridor, oriented northeast-southwest, mainly defined by a felsic dyke. Situated within the corridor, the Margarita Mine is a small operating underground copper mine. [Golden Arrow cautions that proximity to a mining operation does not indicate that mineralization will occur in sufficient quantity or grade on Golden Arrow's property that would result in an economic extraction scenario.] Plus 1% copper values are hosted in crackle breccias and veins along lithologic boundaries and fault traps, extending outwards from the structural corridor up to 200 metres. Approximately one third of the southwest part of the MMT is located within the Rosales Project, and similar mineralization has been found in this part of the trend on the Rosales property at surface. Chalcocite and chrysocolla was identified in outcrop, filling fractures and disseminated in the andesites, in an area covering 100 x 200 metres. Five rock chip samples from this area averaged 2.53% copper with a highest value of 4.37 % Cu. There are further indications of a manto-type mineralization two to four metres thick in this zone.

The NW Target is located 2.7 kilometres to the northwest of the MMT. It includes outcrop with veinlets and fractures hosting quartz-chalcocite-copper oxides within an area measuring 1,500 by 400 metres. This mineralization is hosted by porphyritic andesite and dacite, which may represent a dome complex. Eight chip samples collected from old trenches and pits throughout the target area averaged 3.19% Cu and 13.9g/t Ag with a highest value of 5.74% Cu and 37.1g/t Ag. Most of the chip samples were taken over 2 metres of width from trenches between 50 and 400 metres apart. The anomalous silver values together with the presence of low temperature opaline-silica veinlets in the dacite suggests a possible epithermal system at depth. Two samples from the east end of the target of quartz-chalcedony veins contained low metal values.

Reconnaissance sampling also detected four other showings with mineralization in old pits. Six samples returned values ranging from 1.42% to 4.66% Cu.

Golden Arrow completed detailed mapping of the Margarita Trend and NW targets, as well as a soil sampling program, as announced on September 14, 2020. On April 29, 2021, the Company announced the commencement of a Transient Electromagnetic (TEM) surface geophysical survey. The goal of the program was to detect and delineate prospective electromagnetic conductor responses, consistent with near-surface copper stockwork mineralization, potentially related to Manto-type mineralized copper systems at depth.

The first results of the survey were reported on June 24, 2021 with the identification of three large, near-surface conductive anomaly targets. The highest priority target, based on size, strong conductivity and correlation with high-copper values in surface rock-chip samples, was deemed to be a conductive area with a surface expression of 850 by 500 metres located on the Margarita Trend ("G1"). A second large conductive anomaly was identified approximately 500 metres to the southeast, ("G-2") with surface dimensions of 600 by 400 metres, open to the south. A third conductive target ("G3") was identified 2650 metres to the northwest of G1, near the NW Target surface anomalies. A subsequent TEM sounding survey in the MMT area provided vertical sections resolving one or more zones of moderate conductivity within 250m of surface, interpreted to correlate with the previously reported G1 and G2 anomalies (see August 4, 2021 News Release). Additionally, the TEM sounding survey detected a more prominent sub-horizontal conductor at approximately 500m depth, and with occasional sub-vertical zones of increased conductivity connecting the near-surface and deep conductive features. The deep conductor appeared to be more prominent below the G1 anomaly. The flat-lying and layered appearance of the anomalies, combined with the copper sulphide mineralization observed at surface, were interpreted as consistent with expectations for copper manto (stratabound) deposits.

In addition to the TEM surveys, Golden Arrow completed a ground-based magnetic survey covering 5,035 hectares. Preliminary interpretation of the data indicated zones of low magnetism coincident with the TEM in-loop survey conductivity anomalies. This pattern has been observed at other mantos-type copper deposits.

On September 23, 2021, the Company announced that it had started a reverse circulation drill program. Eight holes totaling 2300 metres were completed to test both the upper and lower conductors and confirm the interpretation of the G1 and G2 anomalies, as well as test the G3 target. The drilling has concluded and did not confirm the geophysical interpretation. Next steps are being evaluated for the project.

## **2. Argentina**

### **2.1 Flecha de Oro Gold Project, Rio Negro**

#### **2.1.1 Background and Agreements**

The Flecha de Oro Gold Project currently includes 2,000 hectares in the province of Rio Negro, Argentina. The project is road-accessible at a modest elevation of approximately 950 metres above sea level that allows for year-round exploration. The town of Los Menucos is situated about 65 kilometres to the northeast. The target of the project is high and low-sulphidation epithermal gold mineralization.

The project previously included the optioned Puzzle and Esperanza exploration properties, consisting of 1,952 hectares and 9,968 hectares respectively. Under the terms of the Definitive Agreement announced September 25, 2019, Golden Arrow had to make staged payments to the vendor totaling US\$2,090,000 over eight years to earn a 100% interest in both properties. The vendor was to retain a 1% royalty, which can be reduced to 0.25% for an additional US\$1,000,000. As announced on September 14, 2020, due to the work restrictions imposed by COVID-19, Golden Arrow negotiated with the property vendor to delay 50% of the September 2020 payment to July of 2021 and extend the subsequent payment to July 2022. After completing detailed surface exploration, trenching and geophysical programs, Golden Arrow announced on March 24, 2022 that it has relinquished its option for the Puzzle and Esperanza properties. The Company determined that the results did not justify continued work, under the option agreement, and wrote-off \$77,764 in acquisition costs.

On June 8, 2020, the Company announced that it had added a third property area to the project, under a separate option agreement. The Maquinchao area is comprised of two adjacent concessions of 500 and 1500 hectares respectively. Golden Arrow signed an option agreement to earn 100% of the properties. The owner will retain 1% net smelter royalty. There are no minimum work commitments. Work permits and surface agreements were approved early in 2022.

### 2.1.2 Exploration - Esperanza and Puzzle Concessions (relinquished)

Golden Arrow's due diligence and reconnaissance work confirmed high-grade gold in surface samples and identified numerous trends of quartz veins and stockworks at surface, with the opportunity to delineate larger zones of mineralization. The Company initiated a program of mapping at both properties, as well as surface sampling and ground magnetic surveys. (This work is summarized below; for additional details of the early program please refer to the news releases dated September 25, 2019, December 3, 2019, March 2, 2020 and June 8, 2020.) In April 2020, the Company suspended field work due to the COVID-19 crisis. The technical team undertook data processing of results to refine targets for follow-up when field work resumed. In addition, as reported on September 14, 2020, Golden Arrow commenced the permitting process for exploration at Maquinchao.

At Esperanza, early exploration work identified quartz veins with low sulfidation epithermal textures and more than 16 kilometres of cumulative strike length. Highlights of vein sampling results include: 24.0 g/t Au over 2 m, 18.0 g/t Au over 0.7 m including visible gold, 13.09 g/t Au over 5 m, 4.16 g/t Au over 2 m and 4.21 g/t Au over 1 m. A distinct set of veins with base metal mineralization returned highlight results of: 99 g/t Ag and 2.8% Cu over 0.2m, 129 g/t Ag, 3.5% Cu and 0.2% Bi over 1.2m, 52 g/t Ag, 0.25% Cu and 724 g/t V over 0.3m. Subsequent targets include a series of sub-parallel quartz veins in an apparent structural corridor that was mapped over 230 metres in length and up to 30 metres of width, open in both directions along strike. Highlights from sampling of this target include: 24.4 g/t gold and 13.6 g/t silver from a float/boulder sample; 5.23 g/t gold and 32.3 g/t silver over 0.30 metres from a vein chip sample, and; 4.3 g/t gold and 2.3 g/t silver over 0.30 metres from a vein chip sample.

At Puzzle, ground magnetic surveying was successful in identifying a magnetic low related to a corridor with gold-mineralized quartz veins and adjacent stockwork. The corridor measured 150 metres in width, and was delineated over 6.5 kilometres in length. The sampling program identified mineralized quartz veins and sub-outcrop in the anomaly corridor, with results up to 1.89 g/t gold.

On December 7, 2020, Golden Arrow announced the resumption of field activities, beginning with a new trenching and sampling program of up to 2,500 metres to delineate and prioritize targets for drilling. The program commenced at the Puzzle property where results from the first 10 trenches identified gold in multiple samples over significant widths in several trenches, but at grades below the threshold targeted by the Company. As a result, in early March 2021 the Esperanza property was prioritized for on-going exploration. At Esperanza, trenches were opened to sample areas where the earlier surface sampling programs returned high-grade gold in the vein corridors defined by outcropping quartz veins, boulders and quartz float. A total of thirty trenches totaling 2,200 metres were completed. The trenches were opened across surface quartz veins and sheeted veinlets that range from a few centimeters to two metres in width. 851 samples were collected.

Of particular note are results from a single vein on the Esperanza property, mapped over 540 metres of strike extent, that returned significant gold intervals in trenches T-6 and T-10, located approximately 160 metres apart. The most significant interval returned in the program was five metres averaging 2.98 g/t gold, including two metres averaging 6.21 g/t gold, in trench TE-10, as reported in the April 29, 2021 news release.

### *2.1.3 Exploration – Maquinchao Concession*

On May 20<sup>th</sup>, 2022, the first exploration program was announced. Due diligence sampling had identified high-sulphidation epithermal signatures including silicified breccia outcrop over one kilometre with strong alteration and coincident gold, copper, and silver anomalies. The program has started with a ground magnetic survey to map the structures and will include detailed surface sampling to identify additional anomalies.

## *2.2 Libanesa*

### *2.2.1 Background and Agreement*

On June 1, 2021, Golden Arrow announced that it had entered into a binding letter of intent (“LOI”) with Mirasol Resources Ltd. (TSX-V: MRZ) (“Mirasol”) for an option to acquire a 75% undivided interest in Mirasol’s Libanesa silver-gold project (“Libanesa”) in the province of Santa Cruz, Argentina. Libanesa is a 14,500 ha Ag-Au (Pb) project, discovered and staked by Mirasol. It is located at the northeastern margin of the Deseado Massif Au-Ag metallogenic province, approximately 70 km west from the port of Puerto Deseado, 40 km northwest of the Cerro Moro Mine operated by Yamana Gold and 100 km northeast of the Don Nicolas mine operated by Cerrado Gold.

Cerro Rotundo was the principal target, characterized by a mineralized Au/Ag hydrothermal breccia that is exposed at surface, and both chargeability and resistivity geophysical anomalies at depth. The hydrothermal breccia is approximately 50 metres in diameter and is hosted in lapilli and crystal tuffs and pyroclastic breccias. Mineralization is mainly hosted in the matrix of the breccia with chip samples from the previous operator of up to 2.55 g/t Au and 2802 g/t Ag and channel samples of 11 metres @ 1.21 g/t Au and 13 g/t Ag.

Approximately 5.5 kilometres north of Cerro Redondo, the Lagunita target includes typical low sulfidation type epithermal veins and breccias. Intermittent vein occurrences, outcropping/subcropping through post mineral cover, were mapped by previous operators over a strike length of at least 2.3 kilometres.

Under the terms of the binding agreement signed and announced in October 2021, Golden Arrow could earn a 75% interest in Libanesa over six years (the “Option Period”) by meeting the following commitments:

On July 21, 2022 Golden Arrow announced that it had met its initial commitments for the option agreement but that based on the results of its first exploration programs it had elected to relinquish the option.

### 2.2.2 Exploration

The Company mobilized a field crew to the project in late 2021. Surface mapping and sampling were undertaken, as well as trenching, and by mid-March 2022 the technical team has collected 274 channel and rock chip samples by opening 20 trenches. Channel sampling at Cerro Redondo confirmed disseminated mineralization in the crystal tuffs with up to 0.32 g/t Au and 15 g/t Ag outside the main hydrothermal breccia. Golden Arrow's surface program identified a second target near the Lagunita prospect, named Lagunita West, where silicified tuffs with quartz veinlets and disseminated pyrite define a different epithermal system that includes high gold and low silver. Twelve rock chip samples collected over 400 metres at Lagunita West returned 4 anomalous values of 2.4 g/t Au, 0.31 g/t Au, 0.17 g/t Au and 0.15 g/t Au, coincident with a northwest striking magnetic low.

Between March and July 2022 Golden Arrow completed a diamond drilling program at Libanosa. The program drilled 1,716 metres of core in holes ranging from 75 to 250 metres in depth, testing the Cerro Redondo and Lagunita prospects.

Golden Arrow met and exceeded its minimum work commitment requirements, and after evaluating the results from the program decided not to proceed with the option.

### 2.3 Portfolio

Golden Arrow has built a portfolio of over 181,000 hectares of exploration properties in four provinces of Argentina. These properties are prospective for a variety of precious and base metal deposit types and have had varying degrees of work completed in the past. The Company seeks option/joint venture partners to explore the portfolio projects as they are often in remote locations requiring significant work and time commitments to fully evaluate them. This strategy allows Golden Arrow to focus on lower-risk projects that can be quickly and efficiently advanced, while continuing to review and acquire additional new opportunities. A summary of the geology and exploration programs for the most prospective portfolio projects can be found on the Company's website, and additional details are available in the original news releases filed on SEDAR.

In keeping with its strategy for portfolio projects, on March 9, 2021 Golden Arrow announced that, through its wholly-owned subsidiary, Desarrollo de Recursos S.A. ("DDR") it had optioned its Caballos Copper-Gold project to Hanaq Argentina S.A. ("Hanaq"). In order to earn a 70% interest in the Project, Hanaq has guaranteed a minimum US\$0.5 million in expenditures on exploration within two years, followed by US\$3.5 million in exploration expenditures within six years of the agreement date. After completion of the option earn-in, a joint venture company comprised of 70% Hanaq and 30% DDR will advance the Project on a pro rata basis, with provisions for dilution.

In May 2022, the Company announced another property option agreement, this time for the Mogote Copper-Gold project in San Juan province. Golden Arrow, through its wholly-owned Argentinean subsidiary, executed a definitive agreement with Australian-based Syndicate Minerals Pty ("Syndicate"). The agreement gives Syndicate the option to earn an 85% interest in Mogote. An initial 80% interest can be earned by spending \$5 million on exploration at the Project over five years and making cash payments of \$1.9 million over five years, including a payment on signing of \$150,000. After completion of the option earn-in, Syndicate can complete a feasibility study to earn a further 5% interest. After that, a joint venture company will advance the Project on a pro rata basis, with provisions for dilution.

#### 2.3.1 Yanso

The Yanso Gold Project includes 12,480 hectares in five non-contiguous concessions in San Juan province, Argentina. The properties were formerly considered part of the Company's Pescado project. Yanso is a gold-copper intrusive-related target with a 300 metre by 90 metre zone of strong alteration coincident with gold and other geochemical anomalies, which is open along strike and untested at depth.

Detailed airborne magnetics identified an intrusive body, and strong silica-illite-pyrite alteration is exposed at the contact with the intrusive. The alteration is exposed between two major drainages and at the intersection of two structural trends. Golden Arrow has conducted limited surface sampling programs over the target in the past that identified geochemical anomalies, with gold assay highlights from rock chips noted above as disclosed in the February 19<sup>th</sup>, 2008 news release. Potential strike extensions of the mineralized zone are buried by alluvial cover.

On July 23, 2021, Golden Arrow announced that it had started a new exploration program at Yanso, including a 6.6 line-kilometre Induced Polarization ("IP") - Resistivity survey and a 700-hectare ground magnetics survey. In addition to the geophysical work, the field team initiated a surface reconnaissance program of mapping and rock sampling. Results from this work will be used to further market the project to potential joint-venture partners.

### **3. Paraguay**

#### **3.1. Tierra Dorada Gold Project, Paraguay**

##### ***3.1.1. Background and Agreement***

On August 14, 2019, Golden Arrow announced that it had entered into an option agreement to acquire a 100% interest in the highly prospective Tierra Dorada Project, a district-scale high-grade gold project covering an area of 640 km<sup>2</sup> (63,854 ha) in two blocks in southeastern Paraguay ("Tierra Dorada"). The city of Villa Florida is in the centre of the project at 80 metres above sea level. The topography is relatively flat, with scarce outcrop. Powerlines cross both property blocks. Tierra Dorada is located in an under-explored area underlain by Precambrian crustal rocks that exhibits geological characteristics and styles of mineralization similar to those associated with many significant Orogenic-type gold deposits in similar geologic terranes in Brazil, Canada and West Africa. The southern property block has been the focus of most of the limited historical exploration work to date in the area, with four main target areas delineated.

The terms of the Definitive Option Agreement (the "Agreement") included staged escalating payments over six years totaling US\$2,000,000, with an additional payment of US\$2,000,000 due thirty (30) working days following the date of commencement of any commercial production on the Property.

On May 20<sup>th</sup>, 2022, Golden Arrow announced that, following a review of the compiled results from all completed programs, management decided to terminate the Company's option agreement for the Project and wrote-off \$449,881 in acquisition costs.

##### ***3.1.2 Exploration***

On December 5, 2019, Golden Arrow reported that it commenced its work program in the southern property block at one of the four previously identified target areas known as Alvaro. At the Alvaro target area there were four known showings, ("Showings 1-4") spanning 2.5 kilometres, with sub-outcropping gold-mineralized quartz vein boulders. At Showing 1, sampling by a previous operator reportedly yielded assays of up to 148.4 g/t Au. A detailed review of these sub-outcrops indicated two parallel structures striking northeast, 25 metres apart with gold-bearing massive crystalline quartz suboutcrop occurring over a strike length of approximately 200 metres. Historic values and Golden Arrow samples averaged 59.2 g/t Au in one of the structures (based on 6 samples) and 34.6 g/t Au in the other (based on 2 samples). Additional field work in the area identified a new, previously un-sampled, sub-outcrop area of aligned quartz vein boulders 150 metres in length; a grab sample assayed 47.4 g/t Au. This vein is parallel to the previous two and located 250 metres to the northwest, but is highly brecciated including clasts of host rock, possibly indicating a significant breccia zone in this area, now called Showing 4.

On May 27, 2020, the Company reported that assays had been received from channel samples in the first four of eight trenches dug at the Alvaro prospect earlier in the field season. Highlights of 89.5 g/t gold and 61 g/t silver over 0.93 metres, including 143.40 g/t gold and 95.8 g/t silver over 0.58 metres, were reported from Trench 1 at Showing 1. New boulder sampling over a kilometre to the south of this trench returned 13.7 g/t Au.

On July 30, 2020, Golden Arrow reported additional results from trenching, including assays of 11.14 g/t gold and 6.36 g/t gold from a 0.78 wide vein at Showing 4. On August 28, 2020, the Company announced that it had commenced the first diamond drilling program at the Alvaro target area. The prospecting permit for the project allowed the Company to drill holes up to 20 metres in depth, which was deemed sufficient for testing near-surface prospects to delineate targets for deep drilling in greater detail than was possible with trenching. The drill program was designed to include a nominal 500 metres of drilling in shallow holes to test at least 8 of the known quartz vein showings, including the hanging wall and footwall rocks which were difficult to sample with trenching.

The end of the program was announced on January 19, 2021, with 550 metres drilled in 41 holes at showings 1, 2 and 4. The program provided key insights into the location and behavior of gold mineralized veins at Alvaro. Highlights of gold intercepts include:

- 143.5 g/t gold over 0.5m, within 6m averaging 14.53 g/t gold at 3-9m depth (DHTD18, Showing 1)
- 11.8 g/t gold over 3.16m, within 7.75m averaging 6.09 g/t gold at 1.70-9.35m depth (DHTD35, Showing 2)

Coincident with the drill program, Golden Arrow completed a 4.2km<sup>2</sup> IP survey at Showings 1-4 and surroundings. The survey identified multiple new targets, including:

- 1700 m anomalous trend including Showing 1, open to the NE & SW; SW extent connects to broad higher chargeability anomaly;
- A strong coincident chargeability and resistivity anomaly identified 250m SW of Showing 2;
- A higher chargeability zone coincident with sub-outcrops of ferriferous gneiss northwest of Showing 3.

Following the first drilling and IP programs, the Golden Arrow team undertook a detailed soil sampling program over the new geophysical targets that have no surface outcrop, to help refine drill targets in those areas.

On September 28, 2021, a second diamond drilling program was initiated and was still underway in the fourth quarter of the year. The program plan of up to 2,000 metres was mainly focused on follow-up drilling to better define the high-grade Alvaro target, but also included several initial holes to test the Itayuru target, located approximately ten kilometres southwest of Alvaro.

The drill program started with shallow drilling of up to 1,000 metres in 50 holes, in compliance with the Company's prospecting permit. Granting of the full exploration permit enabled the program to transition to include deeper holes. Drilling finished in the first quarter of 2022, included 46 drill holes totaling 1791.80 metres testing the Alvaro and Itayuru prospects. Results were released in May 2022 and returned several discrete intercepts of high-grade gold. However, continuity of mineralization could not be established and management feels that it is unlikely that a resource will be delineated in a timely fashion. Golden Arrow has therefore elected to drop its option for the project in order to focus efforts elsewhere.

## **Results of Operations – For the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to the six months ended June 30, 2021**

### **Loss from operating activities**

During the six months ended June 30, 2022, loss from operating activities increased by \$1,364,370 to \$4,143,955 compared to \$2,779,585 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The increase in loss from operating activities is largely due to:

- An increase of \$1,642,736 in exploration expenses. Exploration expense was \$2,840,639 for the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$1,197,903 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The Company undertook more exploration work during the six months ended June 30, 2022, compared to exploration work performed during the six months ended June 30, 2021.

The increases were partially offset by:

- A decrease of \$349,092 in share-based compensation. Share-based compensation was \$Nil for the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$349,092 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The decrease is due to no granting and vesting of stock options during the six months ended June 30, 2022, compared to granting of 4,655,000 of fully vested stock options during the six months ended June 30, 2021.



## **Other items**

During the six months ended June 30, 2022, other income increased by \$258,436 to \$511,694 compared to \$253,258 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The change in other items is largely due to:

- An increase of \$667,989 in foreign exchange gain. Foreign exchange gain was \$845,573 for the six months ended June 30, 2022, compared to \$177,584 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The increase is due to fluctuation in foreign exchange rates and differing amounts of foreign currencies held during the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to the six months ended June 30, 2021.
- An increase of \$527,645 in impairment of exploration and evaluation assets. Impairment of exploration and evaluation assets were \$527,645 for the six months ended June 30, 2022, compared to \$Nil for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The increase is due to the Company determining that it would not be exploring the Puzzle and Esperanza properties in Argentina, and Tierra Dorada properties in Paraguay during the six months ended June 30, 2022.

Net loss for the six months ended June 30, 2022 was \$3,632,261 or \$0.03 per basic and diluted loss per share compared to a net loss of \$2,526,327 or \$0.02 basic and diluted loss per share for the six months ended June 30, 2021.

## **Cash Flows**

### **Operating Activities**

Cash outflow from operating activities was \$3,342,008 for the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$1,964,986 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. The increase in cash outflow results primarily from higher exploration, corporate and administrative cash costs, and changes in non-cash working capital balances due to timing of receipt and payment of cash compared to the prior period.

### **Investing Activities**

Cash inflow from investing activities was \$4,071,478 for the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to a cash outflow of \$195,146 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. Expenditures on mineral property interests were \$4,244,539 during the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$194,537 during the six months ended June 30, 2021. Expenditures on equipment were \$Nil during the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$609 during the six months ended June 30, 2021. Disposal of marketable securities generated \$8,316,017 during the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$Nil during the six months ended June 30, 2021, due to sales of the SSRM shares held by the Company during the six months ended June 30, 2022.

### **Financing Activities**

Cash outflow from financing activities was \$72,352 for the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$63,678 for the six months ended June 30, 2021. Lease payments were \$72,352 for the six months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$63,678 for the six months ended June 30, 2021.

## **Results of Operations – For the three months ended June 30, 2022 compared to the three months ended June 30, 2021**

### **Loss from operating activities**

During the three months ended June 30, 2022, loss from operating activities increased by \$1,210,638 to \$2,390,821 compared to \$1,180,183 for the three months ended June 30, 2021. The increase in loss from operating activities is largely due to:

- An increase of \$1,104,676 in exploration expenses. Exploration expense was \$1,676,643 for the three months ended June 30, 2022 compared to \$571,967 for the three months ended June 30, 2021. The Company undertook more exploration work during the three months ended June 30, 2022, compared to exploration work performed during the three months ended June 30, 2021.

## Other items

During the three months ended June 30, 2022, other income increased by \$103,006 to \$152,301 compared to \$49,295 for the three months ended June 30, 2021. The change in other items is largely due to:

- An increase of \$387,587 in foreign exchange gain. Foreign exchange gain was \$401,061 for the three months ended June 30, 2022, compared to \$13,474 for the three months ended June 30, 2021. The increase is due to fluctuation in foreign exchange rates and differing amounts of foreign currencies held during the three months ended June 30, 2022 compared to the three months ended June 30, 2021.
- An increase of \$449,881 in impairment of exploration and evaluation assets. Impairment of exploration and evaluation assets were \$449,881 for the three months ended June 30, 2022, compared to \$Nil for the three months ended June 30, 2021. The increase is due to the Company determining that it would not be exploring the Tierra Dorada properties in Paraguay during the three months ended June 30, 2022.

Net loss for the three months ended June 30, 2022 was \$2,238,520 or \$0.02 per basic and diluted loss per share compared to a net loss of \$1,130,888 or \$0.01 basic and diluted loss per share for the three months ended June 30, 2021.

## Financial Position

At June 30, 2022, the Company had total assets of \$13,674,894 compared with \$17,237,683 in total assets at December 31, 2021. The increase results from an increase in mineral property interests of \$3,716,894, cash of \$657,118 and accounts receivable of \$190,798, partially offset by a decrease in the fair value of marketable securities of \$8,126,266.

## Liquidity and Capital Resources

As of June 30, 2022, the Company had a working capital of \$8,582,417 (December 31, 2021 - \$15,701,998). Working capital is defined as current assets less current liabilities and provides a measure of the Company's ability to settle liabilities that are due within one year with assets that are also expected to be converted into cash within one year. The Company believes it has adequate working capital to maintain operations for the next 12 months.

The Company does not know of any trends, demand, commitments, events or uncertainties that will result in, or that are reasonably likely to result in, its liquidity either materially increasing or decreasing at present or in the foreseeable future. Material increases or decreases in liquidity are substantially determined by the success or failure of the exploration programs.

### *Share Purchase Option Compensation Plan*

The Company has a share purchase option plan (the “Plan”) approved by the Company’s shareholders that allows it to grant share purchase options, subject to regulatory terms and approval, to its officers, directors, employees and service providers. The Plan is based on a fixed number of eligible shares equaling 20% of the Company’s outstanding common shares calculated at June 25, 2013, amended April 22, 2021, totaling a maximum of 11,500,000 share purchase options.

The exercise price of each share purchase option is set by the Board of Directors at the time of grant but cannot be less than the market price less allowable discounts in accordance with the policies of the TSX Venture Exchange. Share purchase options granted generally vest immediately, are subject to a four-month hold period and are generally exercisable for a period of five years.

### **Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements**

### **Related Party Balances and Transactions**

On June 1, 2017, the Company entered into a Management Services Agreement with Grosso Group to provide services and facilities to the Company. Grosso Group is a private company that is owned by an officer and director of the Company and also has another director in common with the Company. Grosso Group provides its member companies with administrative and management services. The member companies pay monthly fees to Grosso Group on a cost recovery basis. The fee is based upon a pro-rating of Grosso Group's costs including its staff and overhead costs among the member companies. The current monthly fee is \$32,800 per month. This fee is reviewed and adjusted quarterly based on the level of services required.

The Management Services Agreement contains termination and early termination fees in the event the services are terminated by the Company. The termination fee includes three months of compensation and any contractual obligations that Grosso Group undertook for the Company, up to a maximum of \$750,000. The early termination fees are the aggregate of the termination fee in addition to the lesser of the monthly fees calculated to the end of the term and the monthly fees calculated for eighteen months, up to a maximum of \$1,000,000. The agreement expires on December 31, 2023 and will be automatically renewed for an additional period of two years unless otherwise terminated pursuant to the terms of the agreement. ### **Events After the Reporting Period**

#### *Libanesa Project*

On July 21, 2022, the Company announced that it had determined to cease further exploration of its Libanesa project and terminate its option agreement (see also [2.2 Libanesa](#)).

### **Financial Instruments**

The Company thoroughly examines the various financial instrument risks to which it is exposed and assesses the impact and likelihood of those risks. These risks may include credit risk, liquidity risk, currency risk, and interest rate risk. Where material, these risks are reviewed and monitored by the Board of Directors.

#### *Credit risk*

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. Financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to credit risk consist of cash, amounts receivable and exploration funding receivable. The majority of the Company's receivables result from exploration funding for expenses incurred and are with a reputable mining company in good standing.

Overall the Company's credit risk has not changed significantly from the prior year. The Company places its cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments with financial institutions with high credit ratings, the credit risk is minimal.

#### *Liquidity risk (See Liquidity and Capital Resources)*

Liquidity risk is the risk that the company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company has in place a planning and budgeting process to help determine the funds required to ensure the Company has the appropriate liquidity to meet its operating and growth objectives. The Company has historically relied on issuance of shares and warrants to fund exploration programs and may require doing so again in the future.

As at June 30, 2022, the Company has \$322,161 in accounts payable and accrued liabilities that are due within one year of the date of the statement of financial position.

## ***Market risk***

### ***(i) Security Prices***

Security price risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in the market prices. Investments in marketable securities measured at fair value are exposed to changes in share prices that would result in gains or losses recognized in the Company's other comprehensive income. A 10% change in prices would change the Company's other comprehensive loss by \$700,000.

### ***(ii) Currency risk***

Financial instruments that impact the Company's net earnings or other comprehensive income due to currency fluctuations include cash accounts, amounts receivable and accounts payable in: US dollars, Argentine Pesos, Chilean Pesos and Paraguayan Guarani. The sensitivity of the Company's net earnings and other comprehensive income to changes in the exchange rate between the Canadian dollar and the United States dollar, Argentine Peso, Chilean Peso and Paraguayan Guarani at June 30, 2022 is summarized as follows:

- A 10% change in the US dollar exchange rate relative to the Canadian dollar would change the Company's net loss by \$111,000.
- A 10% change in the Argentinean peso exchange rate relative to the Canadian dollar would change the Company's net loss by \$14,000.
- A 10% change in the Chilean peso exchange rate relative to the Canadian dollar would change the Company's net loss by \$1,000.
- A 10% change in the Paraguayan Guarani exchange rate relative to the Canadian dollar would change the Company's net loss by \$3,000.

The Company may acquire and transfer marketable securities from time to time, to facilitate intragroup funding transfers between the Canadian parent and its Argentine operating subsidiaries. The Company does not acquire marketable securities and engage in these transactions for speculative purposes. In this regard, under this strategy, the Company generally uses marketable securities of large and well-established companies with high trading volumes and low volatility. Nonetheless, as the process to acquire, transfer and ultimately sell the marketable securities occurs over several days, some fluctuations are unavoidable. As the marketable securities are acquired with the intention of a near term sale, they are considered financial instruments that are held for trading, all changes in the fair value of the instruments between acquisition and disposition are recognized through profit or loss.

### ***(iii) Interest rate risk***

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. Cash bears no interest and short-term investments are redeemable at any time without penalty, with interest paid from the date of purchase. The fair value of cash and short-term investments approximate their carrying values due to the immediate or short-term maturity of these financial instruments. Other current financial assets and liabilities are not exposed to interest rate risk because they are non-interest bearing or have prescribed interest rates.

## **Risk Factors and Uncertainties**

The Company's operations and results are subject to a number of different risks at any given time. These factors include, but are not limited to, disclosure regarding exploration, additional financing, project delay, titles to properties, price fluctuations and share price volatility, operating hazards, insurable risks and limitations of insurance, management, foreign country and regulatory requirements, currency fluctuations and environmental regulations risks. Exploration for mineral resources involves a high degree of risk. The cost of conducting programs may be substantial and the likelihood of success is difficult to assess. A number of the risks and uncertainties are discussed below.

*History of losses:* The Company has historically incurred losses as evidenced by its audited consolidated financial statements for the six months ended June 30, 2022 and 2021. The Company has financed its operations principally through the sale of its equity securities and through debt. The Company does not anticipate that it will earn any revenue from its operations until its properties are placed into production, if ever. If the Company is unable to place its properties into production, the Company may never realize revenues from operations, will continue to incur losses and you may lose the value of your investment.

*Unexpected delays:* The Company's minerals business will be subject to the risk of unanticipated delays including permitting its contemplated projects. Such delays may be caused by fluctuations in commodity prices, mining risks, difficulty in arranging needed financing, unanticipated permitting requirements or legal obstruction in the permitting process by project opponents. In addition to adding to project capital costs (and possibly operating costs), such delays, if protracted, could result in a write-off of all or a portion of the carrying value of the delayed project.

*Potential conflicts of interest:* Several of the Company's directors are also directors, officers or shareholders of other companies. Such associations may give rise to conflicts of interest from time to time. Such a conflict poses the risk that the Company may enter into a transaction on terms which could place the Company in a worse position than if no conflict existed. The directors of the Company are required by law to act honestly and in good faith with a view to the best interest of the Company and to disclose any interest which they may have in any project or opportunity of the Company. However, each director has a similar obligation to other companies for which such director serves as an officer or director. The Company has no specific internal policy governing conflicts of interest.

*Competition with larger, better capitalized competitors:* The mining industry is competitive in all of its phases. The Company faces strong competition from other mining companies in connection with the acquisition of properties producing, or capable of producing, base and precious metals. Many of these companies have greater financial resources, operational experience and technical capabilities than the Company. As a result of this competition, the Company may be unable to maintain or acquire attractive mining properties on terms it considers acceptable or at all. Consequently, the Company's revenues, operations and financial condition could be materially adversely affected.

*Title risk:* Although the Company has taken steps to verify title to mineral properties in which it has an interest, these procedures do not guarantee the Company's title. Such properties may be subject to prior agreements or transfers and title may be affected by undetected defects.

*Price risk:* The Company is exposed to price risk with respect to commodity and equity prices. Equity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on the Company's earnings due to movements in individual equity prices or general movements in the level of the stock market. Commodity price risk is defined as the potential adverse impact on earnings and economic value due to commodity price movements and volatilities. The Company's property has exposure to predominantly gold. The prices of these metals, especially gold, greatly affect the value of the Company and the potential value of its property and investments.

*Financial Markets:* The Company is dependent on the equity markets as its sole source of operating working capital and the Company's capital resources are largely determined by the strength of the junior resource markets and by the status of the Company's projects in relation to these markets, and its ability to compete for the investor support of its projects.

*Political risk:* Exploration is presently carried out in Argentina and Chile and is currently being reviewed worldwide. This exposes the Company to risks that may not otherwise be experienced if all operations were domestic. Political risks may adversely affect the Company's potential projects and operations. Real and perceived political risk in some countries may also affect the Company's ability to finance exploration programs and attract joint venture partners, and future mine development opportunities.

*Credit risk:* Credit risk is the risk of an unexpected loss if a third party to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company is subject to credit risk on cash, short-term investments, share purchase warrants and amounts receivable. The Company limits its exposure to credit loss by placing its cash and short-term investments with major financial institutions.

*Liquidity risk:* Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they are due. The Company ensures that there is sufficient capital in order to meet short-term business requirements, after taking into account the Company's holdings of cash. The Company raises capital through equity issues and debt and its ability to do so is dependent on a number of factors including market acceptance, stock price and exploration results. The Company's cash is invested in bank accounts.

*Interest risk:* The Company's bank accounts do not earn interest income. Cash bears no interest and short-term investments mature one year from the date of purchase and are redeemable at any time without penalty, with interest paid after thirty days. The fair value of cash and short-term investments approximates their carrying values due to the immediate or short-term maturity of these financial instruments

*Currency risk:* Business is transacted by the Company in a number of currencies. Fluctuations in exchange rates may have a significant effect on the cash flows of the Company. Future changes in exchange rates could materially affect the Company's results in either a positive or negative direction.

*Community risk:* The Company has negotiated with the local communities on its mineral property concessions for access to facilitate the completion of geological studies and exploration work programs. The Company's operations could be significantly disrupted or suspended by activities such as protests or blockades that may be undertaken by such certain groups or individuals within the community.

*Environmental risk:* The Company seeks to operate within environmental protection standards that meet or exceed existing requirements in the countries in which the Company operates. Present or future laws and regulations, however, may affect the Company's operations. Future environmental costs may increase due to changing requirements or costs associated with exploration and the developing, operating and closing of mines. Programs may also be delayed or prohibited in some areas. Although minimal at this time, site restoration costs are a component of exploration expenses.

*COVID-19 risk:* On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the global outbreak of a novel coronavirus identified as "COVID-19" as a global pandemic. In order to combat the spread of COVID-19 governments worldwide have enacted emergency measures including travel bans, legally enforced or self-imposed quarantine periods, social distancing and business and organization closures. These measures have caused material disruptions to businesses, governments and other organizations resulting in an economic slowdown and increased volatility in national and global equity and commodity markets. Central banks and governments, including Canadian federal and provincial governments, have reacted with significant monetary and fiscal interventions designed to stabilize economic conditions. The duration and impact of the COVID-19 outbreak is unknown at this time, as is the efficacy of any interventions.

*Joint ventures and other partnerships:* The Company may seek joint venture partners to provide funding for further work on any or all of its other properties. Joint ventures may involve significant risks and the Company may lose any investment it makes in a joint venture. Any investments, strategic alliances or related efforts are accompanied by risks such as:

1. the difficulty of identifying appropriate joint venture partners or opportunities;
2. the time the Company's senior management must spend negotiating agreements, and monitoring joint venture activities;
3. the possibility that the Company may not be able to reach agreement on definitive agreements, with potential joint venture partners;
4. potential regulatory issues applicable to the mineral exploration business;
5. the investment of the Company's capital or properties and the loss of control over the return of the Company's capital or assets;
6. the inability of management to capitalize on the growth opportunities presented by joint ventures; and
7. the insolvency of any joint venture partner.

There are no assurances that the Company would be successful in overcoming these risks or any other problems encountered with joint ventures, strategic alliances or related efforts.
